What's happening with the season?

After a much wetter than usual start to the 2022/23 season, water deliveries have picked up considerably over the past five months.

The wet end to 2022 resulted in significant access to Supplementary Water followed by high (100%) river allocations.

Customers across the MIA have taken advantage of the improved conditions since December last year to produce a wide range of food and fibre crops.

This includes larger nuts, cotton, summer cereals, summer oilseeds, and summer pasture crops than last season.

There were similar sized crops for citrus, rice, and vines.

Our recent customer cropping survey is indicating another big winter cropping season ahead.

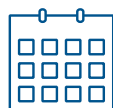
This means we will be working with customers to make full use of our modernised network to meet the winter demand and deliver water, when customers need it in the best way possible.

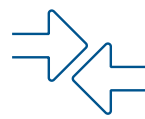

What's happening with customers?

Full Winter Works program



Taking advantage of the cooler months, our winter program of automation, repairs, and scheduled maintenance to irrigation infrastructure is spread across the entire MIA.

The major projects this Winter Works period will be the automation of outlets and regulators across the MIA, as part of our ongoing Automation Project, as well as construction on the new 5,000 ML Roach's Surge Reservoir near Yanco.

Roach's Reservoir is due to be completed by the end of this year, with the full suite of Automation Project works to be delivered by June 2024.

Our maintenance program will continue in parallel with our automation works over the next few months. These works include channel bank repairs, desilting and pump shed maintenance.

Water outages in the areas where there are planned works will vary and a key focus is to minimise impacts to water supply for customers.

Residential Connections deliver water in best way possible

Our new Residential Connections Program is for customers with water entitlements who require water for use on an area up to 1 Ha. This new supply option will enable us to deliver eligible customers their water in the best way possible.

We have introduced this product as part of our unmetered upgrade program, with all Murrumbidgee Irrigation outlets required to be either metered or supplied through a restricted connection by June 2024, under the Off-farm Efficiency Program.

We have a support package available to help existing customers who choose to transition to a Residential Connection.

What's happening with the environment?

Doing things differently to tackle Alligator Weed



Alligator Weed has extremely vigorous growth and poses a major threat to irrigation systems. The potential costs to irrigation farming in the MIA have been estimated to be \$250 million a year if Alligator Weed growth is uncontrolled.

We have upped the ante in the fight against Alligator Weed in recent months with spraying and monitoring via helicopter, boat, and side-by-side vehicles. Another control measure which is proving to be effective is the use of alligator weed curtains in channels, to stop the spread of seed.

We will soon be introducing the use of drones, as an additional surveillance and control measure.

What's happening with MI? Board changes

Independent Director, Steve Whan, resigned from the MI Board before he ran for, and was subsequently successful in winning, the seat of Monaro in the recent State election.

Steve was appointed as an Independent Director in March 2021 and has been a valued contributor to our Company throughout his tenure.

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
